OUR FIRST YEAR ON THE CRIB

In Summary

Work in 2017 was both rewarding, and challenging! Between uncooperative weather and logistical issues, we encountered many challenges, but by the end of summer, we could count it as a successful first season of restoration and renovation.

THANKS TO MANY HELPING HANDS, OUR FIRST YEAR GOES ON THE BOOKS AS A SUCCESSFUL SEASON OF RESTORATION AND RENOVATION.

The mountain of documents and approvals to transfer the deed and ownership took longer than expected, which delayed the start of our renovation until mid-June. Our contractor, Mihm Enterprises, jumped in immediately to begin the hazmat remediation. Over a period of weeks, interior lead paint was scraped, asbestos tiles removed, and 40 years of bird guano scraped from the exterior. It was all bagged (over 150 bags!) and hauled off by boat for proper EPA disposal.

Once the hazmat was removed and the structure safe, exterior painting could begin. This was also a monumental undertaking involving 14 pallets of material weighing over 20,000 lbs. Scaffolding, a trailer-mounted compressor, generators, 4000 lb bags of blasting media, and a blasting rig were just a few of the items that were transported to the lighthouse.

It took weeks to set up the scaffolding from the upper deck to the top of the lantern. Once the scaffolding was in place, the structure was tented with fiber-reinforced plastic, and a negative air pressure system installed to prevent any blasting media or paint from leaving the tented tower. The antenna, lantern, railings, and upper tower were media blasted, primed, then painted.

By this point, summer had slipped away and it was mid-November. The weather had turned and the days the lighthouse could be accessed safely meant less work days. The contractor persisted as long as possible, but conceded to the weather the week before Thanksgiving. 2/3 of the scaffolding was taken down, and all of equipment and supplies were moved inside the Crib for safe winter storage.

In addition to lighthouses, Mihm also restores other historic structures- churches, libraries, courthouses, etc. They are a company big enough to have the proper equipment for the job, yet small enough to adapt to the constantly changing and challenging conditions of lighthouse restoration.

We are grateful for Mihm's help and look forward to continuing our work together to restore The Crib. And, now that the hazmat has been removed, we look forward to getting out there and getting to work ourselves!

WHAT'S IN STORE FOR 2018?

Our Plans for the Upcoming Year

As soon as the weather breaks in the spring, Mihm will be out there with their new supply and personnel boats to complete the exterior painting. By June, the Crib should be sporting shiny new paint from top to bottom!

The lantern glass was also scheduled to be replaced in 2017, but due to the late start, that project will also happen early in the 2018 season.

While the budgets, estimates and fundraising are still in progress, plans are being made for this summer's scheduled work. Some items on the work list:

- 1. Have the sea doors historically reproduced and installed (the original doors were permanently welded shut when the Crib was mothballed in 1980). The sea doors are near the waterline, and if opened and functioning, will make access to the lighthouse much simpler and safer.
- 2. Remove and refurbish all of the exterior windows.
- 3. Install an automated, electronic bird repellent system. Now that the exterior is clean, we need to keep it that way and prevent the cormorants from returning.
- 4. Remove steel deck plates (the plates were installed when the lighthouse was mothballed to prevent water intrusion and help with long-term storage).
- 5. Resurface all deck surfaces and skylights.
- 6. Determine electrical power source for the lighthouse.
- 7. Create a comprehensive interior renovation plan.

Obviously, this list is fluid. Some items may be added or removed depending on timing or available funding. We are excited for our second summer of restoration and have a much better understanding of the logistics and weather challenges.


